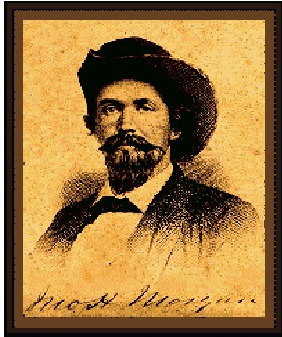
SEPTEMBER BIRTHDAYS & ANNIVERSARIES

September 2, 1864

Fall of Atlanta, occupied by Sherman's army on September 3

September 4, 1864

General John Hunt Morgan killed at Greenville, Tennessee



September 7, 1838

Birth of Major John Pelham



September 8, 1863

Battle of Sabine Pass, Texas
46 Texans under Lt. Richard Dowling halt a Union force of 5,000 infantry, 4 gunboats, and 18 troop transports. The Confederates sank two gunboats and killed or captured 300 of the enemy, with no losses to themselves.



September 10, 1836

Birth of Maj. General Joseph Wheeler



September 17, 1862

Battle of Sharpsburg, Maryland

September 19-20, 1863

Battle of Chickamauga, Georgia

September 20, 1809

CONFEDERATE TRIVIA

Can you identify these Confederate ladies?

1. She was the daughter of President Zachary Taylor; she died of malaria after only three months of marriage.
2. She was the daughter of the president of Washington College (later called Washington and Lee University). She died after a year of marriage from complications of childbirth.
3. She was the daughter of the president of Davidson College in North Carolina. She wrote two books about her husband's life and was known as "The Widow of the Confederacy".
4. She was the step-great-granddaughter of President George Washington. She was well educated, knew Latin and Greek, and edited her father's writings for publication.
5. Her marriage to a doctor was encouraged by Dolley Madison. On her death, this Confederate spy was buried with full military honors.
6. Her grandfather was the third Governor of New Jersey. Her mother was the daughter of an Irish-born planter, and a relative of Aaron Burr. She became the second wife of a man 18 years older than she.
7. Born in what is now West Virginia, she was educated at Mount Washington Female College at Baltimore. For her contributions to the Confederacy, she was awarded the Southern Cross of Honor and made an honorary aide-de-camp to General Jackson.
8. She married her first cousin, and was named for her mother-in-law. She endured a nine-year engagement before marrying. After her husband's death, she wore black for the rest of her life.
9. Her father was a Union Brevet Major General; her brother was a Confederate Brigadier General; her husband was a Confederate Major General.
10. Known as "The Angel of the Confederacy", she was commissioned a captain in the Confederate Army so she could continue her nursing work at Robertson Hospital in Richmond.
11. A painter, musician, and author, she was named "The Daughter of the Confederacy" by Gen. John Brown Gordon for her support of Confederate veterans groups. She was buried with military honors next to her father.
12. An annotated edition of her wartime diary won a Pulitzer Prize for history; it has been called "the most important work by a Confederate author".
